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Course description

This course is the second part in a series of two courses (STAT 4201-STAT 4202) which cover the fundamentals of mathematical statistics and statistical inference. STAT 4202 focuses on the statistical inference part and covers topics such as: point estimation, interval estimation, hypothesis testing, regression, and non-parametric tests.

Prerequisites: C- or better in 4201, Math 4530, or 5530H, or permission of instructor. Not open to students with credit for 3202, 6201, 6302, or 6802.

Course learning outcomes

By the end of this course, students should successfully be able to:

- Calculate and evaluate point estimators.
- Formulate, construct and interpret confidence intervals about parameters in a statistical model.
- Formulate statistical hypotheses, construct appropriate hypotheses tests and interpret results
- Formulate linear regression models, fit these models and interpret the results.
- Construct distribution-free hypotheses testing procedures.

- An easier to use interface to R is available in the software package RStudio. This package
 is available for Windows, Mac, and Linux and can be downloaded for free from
 http://rstudio.org. Note that RStudio requires R to be installed.
- Microsoft Office 365 ProPlus All Ohio State students are now eligible for free Microsoft
 Office 365 ProPlus through Microsoft's Student Advantage program. Each student can
 install Office on five PCs or Macs, five tablets (Windows, iPad® and Android™) and five
 phones.
 - Students are able to access Word, Excel, PowerPoint, Outlook and other programs, depending on platform. Users will also receive 1 TB of OneDrive for Business storage.

Course delivery

The course will be a mix of synchronous and asynchronous content. Synchronous content will be presented live over CarmenZoom, and asynchronous content will be delivered by recorded lectures posted on the class website. We will have our first synchronous lecture at 3 pm on January 11. Detailed instructions for the synchronous/asynchronous lectures will be announced every weekend.

Note that the live lectures and students' participation may be recorded and posted. If you would not like to be recorded, please discuss the materials after I stop recording or during my office hours.

Each week, we will cover approximately 165 minutes of content in total. You will be responsible for watching any live content or recorded videos and studying the material that is assigned. In addition to the lecture videos, assignments will be posted on the class website. You will be given ample time to complete the assignments.

You are assigned to a recitation section. Note that recitation activities will take place via a live CarmenZoom meeting at the times posted on the registrar website.

The instructor will hold weekly office hours via CarmenZoom. The times are given above (see Instructor section).

Homework assignments will be posted on the course website almost every week. All homework must be submitted online as a PDF file through the class website. For each homework assignment, only one or two problems will be graded (by your TA). You are encouraged to discuss homework problems with other students, but you must write your own solutions. The grader for the course does not have the time to provide detailed explanations on each question that is graded. To make up for this, I will endeavor to create homework solutions that are detailed enough to allow you to understand how the question could be approached.
