Course description

Statistics 7201 is a measure-theoretic probability course, which introduces probability from a general and rigorous mathematical viewpoint. This course complements other courses on this topic that you may have had and will help you gain a deeper and more thorough understanding of probability and its relevance in statistics and in the real world. Students will also develop skills in constructing rigorous proofs.

Course learning outcomes

By the end of this course, students should successfully be able to:

- understand probability models from a measure-theoretic perspective
- develop rigorous proofs using advanced probability concepts.
- Connect probabilistic concepts and results to their statistical applicability.

Assignment information

Homework: I will not assign and collect homework for grading purposes. At the end of each Chapter, the textbook contains a collection of practice problems. Students are encouraged to attempt many of these problems in preparation for in-class assessments and exams. A list of suggested practice problems and selective solutions will be available on Carmen.

In-class participation. Students are expected to attend each class and participate in the discussion (ask and answer questions, share opinions, etc.). I will take attendance on a random basis. If you'll miss a class, I hope that you will send me a short note, to let me know.

In-class assessments: We will have regular (every two weeks) in-class assessments. These will take roughly 30 minutes and will be slightly longer than a quiz, but less than an exam. Each assessment will contain 2-3 problems on the topics covered in class most recently. The tentative dates for these assessments are:

• Writing style: While there is no need to participate in class discussions as if you were writing a research paper, you should remember to write using good grammar, spelling,

- **Tone and civility**: Let's maintain a supportive learning community where everyone feels safe and where people can disagree amicably. Remember that sarcasm doesn't always come across online.
- **Citing your sources**: When we have academic discussions, please cite your sources to back up what you say. (For the textbook or other course materials, list at least the title and page numbers. For online sources, include a link.)
- **Backing up your work**: Consider composing your academic posts in a word processor, where you can save your work, and then copying into the Carmen discussion.

Ohio State has had a longstanding practice of making reasonable academic accommodations for students' religious beliefs and practices in accordance with applicable law. In 2023, Ohio State updated its practice to align with new state legislation. Under this new provision, students must be in early communication with their instructors regarding any known accommodation requests for religious beliefs and practices, providing notice of specific dates for which they request alternative accommodations within 14 days after the first instructional day of the course. Instructors in turn shall not question the sincerity of a student's religious or spiritual belief system in reviewing such requests and shall keep requests for accommodations confidential.

With sufficient notice, instructors will provide students with reasonable alternative accommodations with regard to examinations and other academic requirements with respect to students' sincerely held religious beliefs and practices by allowing up to three absences each semester for the student to attend or participate in religious activities. Examples of religious accommodations can include, but are not limited to, rescheduling an exam, altering the time of a student's presentation, allowing make-up assignments to substitute for missed class work, or flexibility in due dates or research responsibilities. If concerns arise about a requested accommodation, instructors are to consult their tenure initiating unit head for assistance.

A student's request for time off shall be provided if the student's sincerely held religious belief or practice severely affects the student's ability to take an exam or meet an academic requirement and the student has notified their instructor, in writing during the first 14 days after the course begins, of the date of each absence. Although students are required to provide notice within the first 14 days after a course begins, instructors are strongly encouraged to work with the student to provide a reasonable accommodation if a request is made outside the notice period. A student may not be penalized for an absence approved under this policy.
