#### Course Delivery

This course meets Mondays and Wednesdays in Cockins 218 from 8:00 am - 8:55 am. If it is safe and healthy for you to do so, attendance is mandatory. Attendance will be taken daily. Each class will be labeled with a week number and a letter, "A" (Monday class) or "B" (Wednesday class). For example, the Wednesday class of week 3 will be Class 3B. This course is 2 credit hours and the course is graded S/U.

The purpose of office hours/student hours is to provide supplemental time for questions, discussion, or assistance that you may need. Any topics related to the course, college life, professional and career development, or personal issues are welcome. A Zoom link can be found on Carmen for virtual meetings. Attendance of office/student hours is always optional but you are welcome and encouraged to attend as frequently as you would like.

#### Course Description

Role of the statistician as both consultant and collaborator; enhancement of analytical and communication skills; structuring working engagements; introduction to consulting-specific technical skills; experience working on consulting projects. Prereq: 6450 (645) or 6950, or permission of instructor. Not open to students with credit for 600 or 601. This course is graded S/U.

# Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students should successfully be able to:

- Plan, hold, and evaluate effective meetings with clients and domain experts
- Effectively and accurately convey statistical and technical topics in accessible format and language verbally and writing
- Use peer evaluation, feedback, and video analysis to improve communication and collaboration skills
- Work effectively and respectfully as a team across different domains of technical expertise
- Create professional technical reports to convey findings to stakeholders
- Conduct, interpret, and report statistical analyses using software
- Design and create effective visualizations to convey results and findings

## Materials

#### Text

Reading materials will be posted to Carmen.

#### Software

- Please bring a laptop every day. If you do not have one, please let me know ahead of time so we can find an alternative.
- Required software: students may use the approved statistical software package of their liking to conduct analyses. I recommend JMP ("Jump"), which is available free to students here: https://www.jmp.com/en/academic/jmp-student-edition. Whatever platform you choose, you must provide reproducible, technically accurate, scientifically relevant analyses and reports based on the output and your findings.
- Required software: R (https://www.r-project.org/) and the graphical user interface R Studio (https://posit.co/download/rstudio-desktop/) will be used for case studies. Both are free for students.
- Required software: Microsoft Office 365 ProPlus. All Ohio State students are now eligible for free Microsoft Office 365 ProPlus through Microsoft's Student Advantage program. Each student can install Office on five PCs or Macs, five tablets (Windows, iPad® and Android™) and five phones. Students are able to access Word, Excel, PowerPoint, Outlook and other programs, depending on platform. Users will also receive 1 TB of OneDrive for Business storage. # Grades and Assignments

Stat 6750 is a graded as Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory (S/U). To receive a Satisfactory grade for the course overall, you must earn an S in all of the following grade categories: 1) Attendance and Participation; 2) Reading Quizzes, and Reflections; 3) Case Studies; and 4) Consulting Project.

## 1) Attendance and Participation

8:00 am is nobody's first choice, but this is the reality in which we find ourselves. Strict attendance will be taken daily. To be counted as present, you must be in your seat and ready to learn when class begins at 8:00 am. Absences will be considered as excused on a case-by-case basis. Documentation such as doctor's notes or a note from your advisor may strengthen your case. Students with two or more unexcused absences will receive a grade of U. Absences should be communicated in advance when reasonable. All absences must be communicated to any team members as well.

Two unexcused tardies will be counted as an unexcused absence. All students will receive one free tardy, for emergencies. All students will also receive one free absence, for emergencies.

Participation grades will be given weekly. To receive a grade of S, students should be actively engaged in the course discussions and activities. Students who are physically present but not mentally present, such as by sleeping, working on their laptop, or browsing their phones, will receive a U. Phones should be kept away. Laptops should only be used during coding or presentation activities. Similarly, students who are not respectful during others' presentations, such as by being inattentive or distracted, will receive a U. Regular engagement and participation in discussion is expected.

Students should be respectful to all others at all times with their undivided attention and consideration. Please keep phones and unrelated work away.

## 2) Readings, Reading Quizzes, and Discussions

Reading assignments will be frequently posted to Carmen. Often, class discussions will center around these readings, so it is imperative that you have read the assignment before class, and are present and prepared to contribute during class.

Reading quizzes are written reflections should represent the individual experiences and perspectives of your field and your work, as well as the content of the reading text. For each individual reading quiz, a grade of S will require the following:

- A professional, thorough written reflection that adheres to the provided guidelines on length, content, and timeliness.
- Prepared, coherent, respectful contribution in class discussions as necessary.

Reading quizzes completed in class will be closed note and written on paper. To receive an overall grade of S in this category requires that no more than one such assignment can receive an Unsatisfactory grade throughout the semester.

We will often discuss the readings and other topics in class. While not every student will necessarily contribute verbally every day to every discussion, it is expected that every student is attentive and engaged in each discussion. Students who frequently contribute and are consistently engaged will earn a grade of S.

#### 3) Case Studies

Case Studies will be short, technical, analytic reports focused on statistical methods that frequently arise in consulting contexts. Reports that are technically accurate, thorough, and professional will earn a grade of S.

#### 4) Consulting Project

The final project will be completed in pairs or in a small group jointly with students enrolled in GRADTDA 5401 with Ohio State's master's program in translational data analytics. This will involve a data analysis summarized in written, visual, and oral formats, as well as consulting meetings with clients. For your final project, a grade of S will require the following:

- Professional respectful work and interactions with your group members and with the clients
- Professional, productive consulting meetings with the clients that adhere to the guidelines and structure discussed in class
- A professional, thorough written reflection that adheres to the provided guidelines on length, content, and timeliness
- Professional, appropriate, relevant data visualizations that contribute to the overall findings of your analysis
- $\bullet$  A submitted recording of your initial intake meeting, and a submitted recording of your follow-up discussion meeting

# Academic Integrity

I take academic integrity very seriously. There is no place at The Ohio State University for academic misconduct, and I have submitted many students in the past for violations including copying other students' work and receiving unauthorized assistance on exams. In all cases, the work you submit must be your own.

- Reusing past work: In general, you are prohibited in university courses from turning in work from a past class to your current class, even if you modify it. If you want to build on past research or revisit a topic you've explored in previous courses, please discuss the situation with me.
- Falsifying research or results: All research you will conduct in this course is intended to be a learning

experience; you should never feel tempted to make your results or your library research look more successful than it was.

• Collaboration and informal peer-review: The course includes many opportunities for formal collaboration with your classmates. While study groups and peer-review of major written projects is encouraged, remember that comparing answers on an exam is not permitted. If you're unsure about a particular situation, please feel free just to ask ahead of time.

## AI Usage

May be Permitted/Appropriate:

- Pasting in error messages generated by code you have written yourself
- Asking to be pointed in the right direction for resources
- Paraphrasing a topic you have phrased yourself
- Correcting grammar
- Translating unknown words and phrases
- Organizing or paraphrasing thoughts or ideas you have already created

*Not* permitted/Inappropriate:

- Pasting in problems that are verbatim or minimally/superficially adjusted
- Asking to have a problem started for you
- Using AI to solve proofs and problems
- Copying or minimally/superficially altering code written by AI
- AI does the thinking for you

The bottom line: if the work you submit represents your own uniquely generated thoughts, it is appropriate. If it represents someone (or something) else's thoughts or work, it is not appropriate. In general, do not submit work you can't defend, because if I have suspicions, I will ask you to defend it.

Given that the learning goals of this class include developing and refining your coding abilities, articulating statistical concepts orally and in writing, and connecting complex statistical concepts with mathematical and computer science tools, the use of generative artificial intelligence tools such as ChatGPT or Copilot is not permitted in this course for purposes including, but not limited to, generating code, finding solutions, or solving problems. Ultimately, any use of GenAI tools for work in this class for labs and homeworks may be scrutinized to ensure it is in adherence with Ohio State's Academic Integrity policy and Code of Student Conduct. If I suspect that you have used GenAI inappropriately on an assignment for this course, I will ask you to explain your process for completing the assignment in question. The unauthorized or inappropriate use of GenAI tools will result in referral to the Committee on Academic Misconduct.

It is the responsibility of the Committee on Academic Misconduct to investigate or establish procedures for the investigation of all reported cases of student academic misconduct. A student may not be penalized for an absence approved under this policy.
